Llansoy.



LANSOY takes its name from Tissoi, the saint to whom the church is dedicated, of whom nothing seems to be known,

except that he was a pupil of St. Dyfrig, the first bishop of Llandaff in the fifth century.

The boundaries given in the Liber Landavensis appear to be similar to the present boundaries, the parish lying between the brooks Olwy and Pill.¹

The parish contains 1415 acres of land and 4 acres of water. The rateable value in 1815 was 1583l., and in 1912, 978l.

The most ancient feature in this parish is the large camp or earthwork situated one mile northwest of the church, 300 feet above sea level, commanding the broad meadows through which the river Olwy runs, and which are but 100 feet above sea level.

In this parish and Llanfihangel Tor-y-mynydd, the chief landowners in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries were descendants of Brychan Brycheiniog, though when they first came here is not clear. Perhaps the house known as Cwrt-Brychan was their first settlement. In Llansoy the family descended from Brychan, who in the seventeenth century adopted the surname of Nicholas, was the principal one. I am uncertain which house, until they inherited Lanpill by marriage, was their residence. In wills and deeds they appear only as of Llansoy, and therefore it is probable that Ty-mawr (the great house) was their abode.

The first to assume a surname was William Nicholas, the son of Nicholas ap William Gruffydd, who made his will 5 May, 1622, proved at Llandaff 16 June, 1624:—

To be buried in the church of Lansoy—the parson of llansoy for forgotten tithes iijs. iiijd.—cathedral church of Landaff ijs.—to Catherine my wife, one moiety of all my linen, pewter and brass for her life, with household stuff and one silver boule and one

silver sault and viij silver sponnes, and after her decease the said moiety to Andrewe Nicholas my son -whereas I hold by several leases and grants one grist mill called Radyr's mill1 and the moiety of one other grist mill called Magor's mill of the rt hon. Edward, earl of Worcester, and one tenement of land of the rt hon. Henry, lord Herbart, being part of the old park in the co. of Mon., these I give to the sd Andrew Nicholas my son-to Phe' Nicholas my son the lease of the tithes of Newchurch-to Ann Nicholas, dau. of my son Phe', xxs.-my son Phe' Nicholas out of the profits of the sd tithes to make yearly payment unto Gilles Nicholas, son of the sd Andrew Nicholas, 51 .- to my men servants and maid servants 5s. a piece-to Elizabeth, dau. of my dau. Bridgett, vil. xiijs. iiijd., and if the sd Elizabeth die before she is 16 the sd sum to the children of my son Andrew and my dau. Dorothy equally-to Wm Nicholas, my grandchild, one black colt-the rest to Catherine my wife.

Nicholas Nicholas (son of Andrew, son of the above William Nicholas) appears in a deed as follows:—

Ind'res made 18 July, 13 Car. II., 1661, between Nicholas Nicholas of Llansoy, gent., and Bridget his wife and Richard Vidler, late of Cwmcarvan, yeom., and Blanch his wife of the one part; and William Jones of Lanarth, esq., of the other part. In cons'on of 2001, the said Nicholas Nicholas and Richard Vidler grant to William Jones all that messuage wherein Thomas John Edmund did lately inhabit, and wherein Thomas William doth now inhabit conts three score acres called Cay keven, Cae yr lloyd, Ton dee, Cay pant, Cae isha, Cae Rees, Cay pwll, lying in Gwailod y wlade in the parish of Cwmcarvan between the lands of Alse Blower, widow, the lands of David Edmonds, the brook called Pencam, the lands of Thomas Pheellipp, the lands of the earl of Pembroke, now or late in the occupation of Adam Jones, and the way leading from the stony bridge towards the church of Cwmcarvan, and also all that water mill now in the occupation of the sd Nicholas Nicholas.

Giles Nicholas,² the brother of the above Nicholas Nicholas, became a clergyman, and was rector of Llangynidr in Breconshire, a living that continued in the hands of his descendants, as will be seen by the pedigree, for many years.

Philip Nicholas, the eldest brother, continued the family at Llansoy, and was father of Andrew, a barrister, who was drowned in 1671, leaving an only child Frances, who died unmarried.

Philip Nicholas, the second son of William Nicholas, whose will is given above, was also of

Llansoy, and was father of Edward, who served the office of sheriff in 1682, and entered his pedigree in the Heralds' visitation of that year. His second wife Judith was widow of Thomas Evans, who, with Robert Jones, and Thomas Jones of Trevethin, was appointed in 1650 one of the commissioners for sequestration of estates under the commonwealth. In March, 1654, he was appointed sole subcommissioner to manage estates and receive rents. receiving an allowance of 12d. in the pound on all he paid in. In November, 1654, he died, and his widow was required to pay up the sum of 1806l. 2s. Judith soon after married Edward of arrears.1 Nicholas, and in 1658 sold land in Llantilio Crossenny to Charles Pewell of Bristol, son of Thomas Powell, the son of Walter Powell of Llantilio.

This ind're made 15 April, 1658, between Edward Nicholas of Trelleck Grange, gent., and Judith his wife of the one part, and Charles Powell of Bristol, apothecary, of the other part. Whereas Robert Knight of Tallycoed, gent., by ind're of feofment duly executed with livery of seizin dated 21 Nov., 1656, in cons'on of 1007. paid him by Judith Evans of Trelleck, widow, sold to the sd Judith all those two parcels of meadow called Lantrothy ycha and Gworlod y gwaire conts 16 acres in Lantilio Crossenny, between the lands of Charles Powell, gent., other lands of the sd Robert Knight, the late lands of Walter Powell, gent., decd, the highway leading from Monmouth to Bergevenny, and the river Trothy, on all or some parts. And whereas the said Judith intermarried before the sd day of payment (20 Nov. last past) with the said Edward Nicholas, and in cons'on of 1061. the sd Edward & Judith grant to the sd Charles Powell, etc.

Andrew Nicholas owned Llangunnock, and is buried in the chapel there.

Andrew Nicholas (the son of Philip, son of Andrew, son of William ap Nicholas) was a barrister, who being drowned in 1671, left an only child Frances, who died unmarried. Philip Nicholas, brother of the above Andrew, then succeeded, and left a son Philip, who seems to have been the last of the race to have any connection with the parish. He made his will 8 December, 1711, proved at Llandaff 10 January, 171½, described as of the town of Usk, gent.

Whereas I am entitled to the reversion, after the death of Ann Curr of Monmouth, widow, of a messuage, etc., in Gwernesney, heretofore purchased by Philip Nicholas, gent. [testator's grandfather], of John Charles, now or late in the possession of Joan Thomas, widow, tenements and woods in Llangwm Isha, three tenements in the town of Usk in the street called Twyn y daley du, I leave the said premises to my wife Hannah Nicholas for her life, and after her decease to John Ambrose, second son of William Ambrose my brother-in-law, provided the sd John Ambrose shall change his name to Nicholas, and also that he pay 1001. to Philippa, an infant now living with me, whom I make my adopted daughter, and in case the sd John Ambrose do not perform these conditions, I leave the same to William Ambrose, gent., son of my said brother-in-law William Ambrose, on the same conditions.

The Church.

The church was founded in the time of bishop Berthgwyn in the latter part of the sixth century by one Cynhageu¹ or Conhae,² when he gave the mansion of St. Tysoi, the pupil of Dyfrig (Dubritius) which formerly belonged to Dyfrig, to God and the holy apostle St. Peter. The boundaries are described as

Between the wood and the field, and between the rivulet Ilgui [Olwy] and Pill; and in the other part from Ilgui to Pill towards the east, from the influx of Ceninuc into Ilgui, along Ceninuc upwards to the influx of the Ffinnant, along the Ffinnant to its source, from the source along to the hollow downwards to Pill, along Pill to the brook Murn, along Murn to its source to Carn Enuin, from the side of Caer Tollcoit to the head of the Cinahi, following downwards by the stone of Cinahi to the Ilgui, along Ilgui to the influx of Ceninuc, where it began.

The church consists of chancel and nave with a tower at the west end and porch on the north side. The stairs to the rood-loft on the south side of the chancel remain. A notable object in the church box is the silver chalice with initials and date, W. P. 1577, on the lid.

The advowson has until recently been in the hands of the lords of Usk and Trelech. In 1322 Llansoy with other churches was conveyed by Hugh le Despencer (whose wife Eleanor was daughter and coheir of Gilbert de Clare, earl of Gloucester and Hertford) to Elizabeth (another daughter of Gilbert), widow of John de Burgh. Since then the advowson has descended as the lordship of Usk and Trelech. By an order in council dated 13 January, 1902, the patronage was transferred by Henry, ninth duke of Beaufort, to the bishop of Llandaff.3

The old parish register book begins in 1599, and is complete to 1812. Among the entries is one relating to the belfry and the casting of a bell.

Churchwardens—.... Christopher Williams 1688 & for ye yeare 1689, who first built the bellfree with stones, And cast the Greate bell which cost besides the raising and carrying of the stones 60*l*.

The building of the tower had been initiated by the rector Geoffrey Prise, who died in August, 1620, and is noticed thus:—


Whereas Geffrey Price, late rect^r of the p'sonadge of llansoy by his last will and testam^t did geve and bequeth towards the errectinge and newe buyldinge of a steeple w'thin lansoy the some of five pounds, and in the meane tyme of the buyldinge thereof that the interest should remayne towards the releef of the poore of the same p'ishe w'ch said vli. was paid in the hands of George Harrie xx° January 1620, and the interest thereof paid to the use aforesaid, and the said



Pedigree of the Family of Powell (Brychan) of Lanpill.





The arms entered at the Visitation of 1683 were: A chevron between 3 choughs, on a canton a chaplet (no colours). Crest.—On a chaplet a chough. To this the herald has added, no proof. The paternal arms which this family ought to have borne were BRYCHAN and EINION AP SELIF quarterly, as shewn above

Another note dated 21 November, 1650, says that Roger William [who was buried in 1630] left 5l. for the same purpose, the interest of which was, until the steeple should be built, to be given to the poor; and Walter Cipery [who was buried 20 July, 1640] left a similar sum.

The will of Roger William referred to above,

described as of Lansoy, yeoman, dated 16 November, 6 Car. [1630], proved at Llandaff 2 December, 1630, is as follows:—

Church of Landaff 2s .- my parish church of Lansoye 6s .- towards the bilding of Lansoye stipell five pownd, the use of this five pownd untill the stipell be bilded to be destrebuted among the poor-to Evan Thomas, son to my brother Thomas William, eight pound, to William Thomas his brother two poundto Walter William, son to William Lewis, five pound -to Rice John my nevo [nephew] ten pound to put to use for his two sons-to John Evan my brother-in law three pound—to Jaine John, dau. of John Evan, fower pound-to Elizabeth John, the other dau. of John Evan, ten pound-to Jaene, wife of Edward Will'm, and his three dau's ten pound equally—to the seven children of David John Howell ten shillings a piece-Elinor, wife of William Lewis, five pound [other legacies].

LLANSOY CHURCH.

A note dated 2 June, 1659, referring to the money in hand, proceeds—

Nowe findinge that the belfree is readie to fall downe & the tymber altogeither rotten & not to be rep'ed, therefore the p'ishon's of Lansoy unanimously consent and agree to build up a new belfree (with the Lord's assistaunce) as soone as possible may be, and doe agree that the s'd ffiue pounds in the hands of the s'd John Watkin shall be paid into the hands of the churchwardens of Lansoy to be imployed to bring materrialls and to paie workmen for the digging up of stonns towards the said worke.

By this it may be concluded that the tower as it

is seen now was built about 1688, and took the place of one which was of timber.

In 1613 the plague appeared in the parish, noted thus in the parish register:—

1613, August—In the Beginninge of this monthe two housses were Infected, the Tavarne house and m^r W^m nicholas. In the tavarne there died a maid, Batman & his wife, Robart and Joan fortune—In m^r W^m nicholas house there died Briget and the maid-servant. 1613, Aug. 31, Margaret Bowen died of the plague & was Buried the last daie of August.
